Heart of Virginia Festival 2017



This marked the first time the MWBC has hosted a booth at the Heart of Virginia Festival in Downtown Farmville. The experience was a wonderful success as we shared bird information with the public, kept a bird sightings tally, and brought in over \$100 to the club coffers selling bird feeders.

Warbler Road 2017

On Tuesday, May 9 a group of eleven MWBC members and friends completed the annual trip to Warbler Road, a series of interconnected forest roads in the Appalachian Mountains about 13 miles long. The route has been named "Warbler Road" due to the diversity of warblers found during the spring between the end points of the route. Starting on the Blue Ridge Parkway at the Sunset Field overlook (milepost 78.4 at 3474 ft in elevation), the route descends about 2600 ft until you reach the Arcadia area at 853 ft.

Support for the Coastal Wildlife Conservatory


